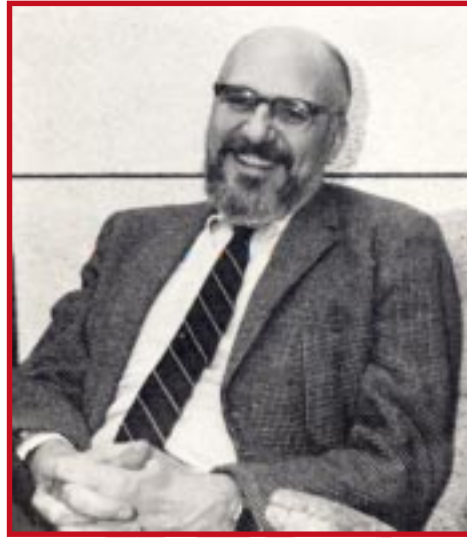


STEWART LINDSAY JR.



Stew attended Exeter Academy, where he was considered the greatest lacrosse player to step on campus. In his three years there, he set every scoring record in existence, and his career total of 100 goals would not be equaled until more than 35 years later.

He went on to Syracuse University, where he also broke numerous scoring records and went on to become a three-time All-American, playing in the 1956 North-South All-Star game. He also was named a Syracuse Letterman of Distinction.

After college, Stew continued his love of the game by playing for many years for the Connecticut Valley Lacrosse Club and starting the lacrosse program at Cheshire Academy.

He came to K-O in 1968 and coached the boys lacrosse team. He helped produce two undefeated seasons, seven league championships, 16 All-Americans, 81 All-League players and two North-South participants and sent varsity level players to 46 colleges and universities. His teams twice won the league sportsmanship award. For many years, Mary Lindsay tirelessly maintained detailed statistics. In addition to lacrosse, he coached football, basketball and middle school hockey.

In 1976, Stew was inducted into the National Lacrosse Hall of Fame in the first year he was eligible.
